6) REPORTS AND DISCUSSION

a) Meetings – Jennie

As usual Jennie, with a little help from others, organised an interesting variety of speaker meetings every month except January and August.

We learnt about the Hebrew idea of Peace from Baptist Minister Lee Reddyhoff. The increasing presence of the military in schools and everyday life was covered by Emma Sangster of ‘Forces Watch’ and County Councillor Judith Heathcoat who explained the purpose of the ‘Armed Forces Covenant’. Chris Cole brought us up to date with advances in drone technology and the increasing use of drones in warfare. International affairs were also covered in ‘NATO: Peacemaker or Warmonger’ with CND GenSec Kate Hudson, ‘What should we think of Trump?’ with Larry Saunders (brother of Bernie), and ‘Climate Change and what to do about it’ with Larch Maxey of Extinction Rebellion. Climate Change was also a recurring theme in presentations by students from FCC on the subject of young peoples’ view of conflict. In January we enjoyed the New Year’s social at Karen and Sjoerd’s.
